Meeting Report 21st March Wentethurit Hening Wount vanstreet



It was very evident from her presentation that Ingrid is an enthusiastic and experienced event organiser, and marketer who has a background of living in the Mount. It was obvious that she is a passionate "Mountie"

She spent most of her time as a youngster at the Mount enjoying the sun and surf. Her parents had lived in the Mount and this encouraged her to relocate here 7 years ago.

Ingrid has three adult children and 2 grand children.

Earlier she had been involved in event management and set up an events company in Taupo, specialising in sporting events and in 2002 the company was named as Small Business of the Year.

Inclement weather thwarted their attempt to stage a beer festival, and a Christmas event at Huka Lodge but had to be abandoned the prior Wednesday by a cyclone prediction. These two disasters not only lost them considerable money but also convinced them to stick to their bread and butter sporting events.

Moving to Tauranga she was employed at Bay Park Events and was responsible for the establishment of the very successful Jet Sprint Event.. Her organisational skills gained her the position of Mount Mainstreet Manager. It is a busy job with flagship events such as the Busking Festival, Vintage Cars on Mainstreet, VW's on Mainstreet, and shopping promotions, as well as respobsble for marketing the centre for the 220+ shops and businesses. New business buildings are giving the street an incredible look and when the new I-site building is established it will be a huge benefit for tourists and Mainstreet. A promotion is being mounted for cycleways around the peninsular and huge changes could be seen with one-way systems for cars and protected cycleways for cyclists. Things look positive for Mount Mainstreet development.

AT LAST ... TIME FOR A FEW SMILES

IN LIGHT OF CURRENT SUPERANNUATION DEBATES, CONSIDER THIS



Reviewing your retirement options? I saw an article about nursing and retirement homes and the expenses. Then it hit me!! No nursing home for me!! Here is my plan: I'm checking in to the Holiday Inn. With the average cost for a nursing home approaching \$188 per day, there is a better way when we get old and feeble. I have already checked on reservations at the Holiday Inn. For a change of scenery, take the airport shuttle bus and eat at one of the nice restaurants there. While you're at the airport, fly somewhere. Meanwhile the cash keeps building up. It takes months to get into a decent nursing home. On the other hand Holiday Inn will take your reservation today. And you're not stuck in one place forever ... you can move from Inn to Inn, or even city to city. Want to see Hawaii? They have a Holiday Inn there too. TV broken? Light bulbs need changing? Need a mattress replaced? No problem. They fix everything and apologise for the inconvenience. The Inn has a night security person and daily room service.

The maid checks if you are ok. If not they will call the undertaker or an ambulance. If you fall and break a hip, Medicare will pay for the hip, and Holiday Inn will upgrade you to a suite for the rest of your life.

And no worry about visits from familyThey will always be glad to visit you, and probably check in for a mini-vacation. The grandkids can use the pool. What more can you ask for? When I discussed my plans with friends, they came up with even more benefits that Holiday Inn provides retirees. Most standard rooms have coffee makers, reclining chairs, and satellite TV, all you need to enjoy a cosy afternoon. After a movie and a good nap, you can check on your children. (free local phone calls), then take a stroll to the lounge or restaurant where you meet new and exotic people every day. Many Holiday Inns even feature live entertainment on the weekends. Regularly they have special offers too, like the Kids Eat Free programme. You can invite your grandkids over after school to have a free dinner with you. I'm happy to report thay they were positively giddy about the idea of us checking in for a year or more. They even offered to negotiate the rate. We could have easily knocked them down lower!!!
